

BEAVERCREEK CITY COUNCIL
REGULAR MEETING March 23, 2009 6:00 p.m.

Don Cole of the Police Department spoke about the Dare and let the Dare winners read their essays, Jacob Mueller from St Luke's School, Mitchell Scott from Beavercreek Elementary and Andrew Sondergaard from Main Elementary. Don Cole thanked Dave Dennis Chrysler Jeep and Dodge for the Dare vehicle that has been donated the last few years and also for the School Resource vehicle.

Mayor Vann presented a Proclamation for Athletes in Action to Dave Lower. Dave Lower stated that the event will be held in Xenia at their facility on May 7 and Clark Kellogg, the Ohio State standout will be the MC. Coach Kelly of UC and some of his players will be there, along with Anthony Munoz who will be interviewing some Bengals players. Two Olympic Gold Medalists will be the inductees Ruth Riley won a gold medal in 2004; she is a 6'5 basketball player and John Peterson, a wrestler who won a silver medal in 1972 and a gold medal in 1976.

Mayor Vann called the meeting to order followed by roll call.

Mr. Hadley led the pledge and a prayer.

Mr. Hadley MOVED to approve the agenda as amended; it was seconded by Mrs. Howard. The Motion PASSED by unanimous voice vote.

Vice Mayor Giambone MOVED to approve the minutes for March 9, 2009, seconded by Mr. Leonard the Motion PASSED by majority voice vote. (Howard and abstain).

Mr. Hadley MOVED to approve the minutes as amended for March 16, 2009, seconded by Vice Mayor Giambone the Motion PASSED by majority voice vote (Howard and Petrak abstain).

PRESCCHEDULED SPEAKER

Governor's New Education Plan-Denny Morrison

Denny Morrison spoke about the Governor's Education Plan and stated that there was quite a bit of misinformation, many are asking him if he is excited about the way the governor is fixing how schools will be funded in the State of Ohio. He wanted to explain what the governor's bill on education will mean to Beavercreek.

The Governor released his proposal in January as House Bill #1 and they are taking testimony in the House and hope to have a vote by April 20th and will probably be signed by July 1st, with some changes. Mr. Morrison stated that there are a lot of good things in the Governor's proposal, he is proposing a school system that prizes creativity, innovation and will focus on critical thinking, problem solving, leadership, collaboration, effective communication, all the things that we need in our lives to be successful and things that business leaders are looking for. He is also proposing items such as full day kindergarten, a longer school year, smaller class sizes and they are noble initiatives that could not be argued against. He was happy to have the Governor address the problem of over reliance on property taxes.

Mr. Morrison is questioning who will pay for this mandate, because Beaver Creek will not get a penny more than they are getting right now. He said they would have to add 12 new kindergarten teachers to go to full day kindergarten, there will be a 40% increase in teachers in kindergarten to fourth grade to go from a 25 to 1 student to teacher ratio to a 15 to 1 student to teacher ratio. The governor is proposing to go from 180 days of school to 200 by adding 2 days a year over the next 10 years, he wants more school nurses, family and community engagement coordinators, social workers, lead teachers, building managers and specialist teachers.

Mr. Morrison said in order to implement the Governor's Plan as it stands today Beaver Creek Schools will have to add an additional 131 positions with no state funding, and the Beaver Creek residents will have to pay for all of it. He said that the schools have not received an increase in funding since 1991 and this is a ten year plan and will cost over 8 million dollars the first year for salaries alone, not including the 62 additional classrooms that will be needed. Mr. Morrison said he is speaking to any of the legislators that will listen stating that he appreciates what the Governor is doing for education but that Beaver Creek should be able to use their local discretion to decide what we need. He said one size does not fit all and since we are getting no money for implementation and because we have had eight years of Academic Excellence, we should be able to decide what needs to be added. There is a one year implementation date which means that it would have to be in place by July 2010

Mr. Petrak stated that with the one year implementation plan it is doomed to failure and the government will then have to come to the rescue of the local school boards. Mr. Morrison agreed and stated he had asked the question what if Beaver Creek could not implement in one year because of lack of funding and they did not have an answer for him.

Vice Mayor Giambone stated that others were also concerned about the Governor's spending plan and funding plan and the general perception was that there will be general revenue funds that will come to the schools to pay for these programs and she thought it was important that people like him pointed out that it is not coming to certain schools and certain programs. She stated that it is about if you have the ability to pay you will pay and where you don't you won't. She also stated that some of the hospitals will be affected by this because their funding will be cut. Mr. Morrison agreed that it was indeed the case and when the Big 8 schools supported this it was because they were also going to get the funding.

Mr. Jarvis asked what kind of money would be needed to build the 62 classrooms. Mr. Morrison stated that he had not calculated that but that it would be a similar bond issue as what was just passed. Mr. Jarvis asked why there had not been any increase in funding since 1991. Mr. Morrison stated that if you look at the state funding formula, Beaver Creek is considered a high wealth district based on the property wealth so therefore there is a joint share in the cost of education and right now Beaver Creek receives only 15% of the cost of education.

Mr. Leonard asked what the citizens could do to help. Mr. Morrison stated that everyone needs to contact their legislators and let them know that they are not happy with the state mandates and it will not work well for Beaver Creek. Vice Mayor Giambone stated that you can get the e-mail address from the State website and can also find out who your representatives are and also an address for the governor and lieutenant governor. She stated that this is the process and everyone needs to let them know that it will not work for Beaver Creek.

PUBLIC HEARING—PUD 622 CU 2/09 Tim Leach

Clerk Bucheit read on an application filed by Timothy Leach, 1231 Beaver Valley Road, Beavercreek, OH 45434. The applicant requests conditional use approval to allow for a bed and breakfast to be permitted in PUD 622. The property is located on the west side of Beaver Valley Road, approximately 700 feet south of Oakbrook Boulevard. The property is further described as Book 5, Page 20, Parcel 170 on the Greene County Property Tax Atlas.

Vice Mayor Giambrone recused herself.

Timothy Leach of 1231 Beaver Valley stated that he is seeking approval for a 2 bedroom Bed and Breakfast on a part-time basis and that all the requirements have been met.

Mr. McGrath stated the applicant requests a Planned Unit Development conditional use approval to conduct a bed and breakfast from the residential property located at 1231 Beaver Valley Road within the Christalee Acres PUD.

The applicant is proposing to conduct a two bedroom bed and breakfast from the approximately 4000 square foot residential structure, while it is still being maintained as the primary residence of the homeowner. As stated in the applicant's letter of intent, no improvements will be made to the exterior of the property with the exception of a small wall sign and the residential character of the property will not be compromised.

Per §158.069 (B), "City Council shall have the appropriate power and duty to hear and decide upon applications for conditional uses which are requested to be approved uses within a PUD. The Planning Commission shall make a recommendation of approval, denial, or approval with conditions and safeguards in conformity with the provisions of this Zoning Code and the Commission's recommendation. Approval of a conditional use application shall expire one year after the effective date of City Council approval..."

The subject parcel is located within PUD 622, which is entirely residential. This 2.5 acre lot is the only parcel within the Christalee Acres PUD that has Beaver Valley frontage. The parcels to the north and the south of this property are designated as A-1 Agricultural by the Zoning Map. The parcel directly to the east, across Beaver Valley Road is also A-1, and is surrounded by Hunters Ridge, an R-PUD. To the west is the remainder of the Christalee Acres PUD.

Bed and breakfast residences are allowed as conditional uses within R-1AA, R-1A, R-1B and R-PUD zoning districts. According to the Zoning Code there are specific conditions that must be met for conditional use approval.

The code requires that there be a minimum of one parking space per guest room and those spaces must be screened from adjacent properties. There is an existing paved asphalt area at the rear of the house that is not visible from the neighboring properties due to evergreens and a difference in grade. This area is proposed to provide six parking spaces including one handicap space.

Screening between properties is also required and this property does comply with §158.115 Screening and Buffering. A conditional use in an underlying R-1B district requires that the building be set back from the adjacent R-1B properties a minimum of three feet for every one foot of building height. The house is set back 260 feet from the adjacent R-1B and exceeds this requirement. As for the parcels to the north and south, there is no requirement between R-1B and A-1, but there exists a substantial amount of screening between all of these properties.

Other requirements for this conditional use include that only the principal structure may be used for the bed and breakfast, the maximum number of guest rooms cannot exceed four, that the house be older than three years, that there be no more than two non-resident employees, and that the exterior appearance of the house not change. A wall sign no greater than 2 square feet in size is also permitted on the façade of the building. As the applicant has outlined in his letter of intent, this proposal will meet all of the above requirements.

There being not public input, the Public Hearing was closed.

Mrs. Howard MOVED to approve PUD 622 CU 2/09

"I move, for the purpose of taking administrative action, approval of a conditional use for Evergreen Sanctuary Bed & Breakfast, PUD 622 CU 2/09, on the basis that City Council finds the facts submitted with the application and accompanying materials, and modifications, amendments and supplementary conditions satisfy the standards and criteria for conditional use approval as per §158.069 (B) of the Zoning Code. Supplementary conditions required of this approval shall be as follows. I further move that this motion with all conditions be fully recorded in the minutes of this Council meeting."

I.

1. The conditional use shall apply only to the subject parcel and no other portion of this PUD.
2. The bed and breakfast shall adhere to all requirements of §158.132 of the City of Beavercreek Zoning Code.
3. A Certificate of Zoning Compliance shall be required prior to any occupancy of the bed and breakfast.
4. The conditional use approval for the bed and breakfast may not be transferred to any other owner and no additional Certificates of Zoning Compliance shall be issued, should there be a change in ownership, until a new conditional use application is approved.
5. Regardless of conditional use approval, this property must conform to all of the requirements of PUD 622, any modifications and its underlying R-1B zoning.
6. No expansions or alterations to the exterior of the building may be made relating to the bed and breakfast unless a conditional use approval is granted.

Seconded by Mr. Leonard it was approved by unanimous voice vote.

ORDINANCE, RESOLUTIONS AND PUDS

Ordinance 09-3 Land Use Plan (Third Reading)

Clerk Bucheit read this Ordinance adopts a recommendation to amend the City of Beavercreek Land Use Plan Map. This is not an emergency ordinance and will become effective 30 days after passage.

Mrs. Howard MOVED to approve Ordinance 09-3, it was seconded by Mr. Jarvis and approved by unanimous voice vote.

Ordinance 09-4 Z-09-1 Janice Morris (Second Reading)

Clerk Bucheit read this Ordinance adopts a recommendation to rezone approximately 9.152 acres of land located on the north side of Kemp Road approximately 1850 feet west of Rustic View Drive (4150 and 4170 Kemp Road) from A-1 Agricultural to R-1A One Family Residential District. This is not an emergency ordinance and will become effective 30 days after passage.

There being no public input the Public Hearing was closed

This Ordinance will move automatically to the Third Reading.

Resolution 09-08 Cooperate with Court of Common Pleas

Clerk Bucheit read a resolution authorizing the City Manager to enter into an agreement with the Greene County Court of Common Pleas for the purpose of cooperating in a Community Service Program.

Mr. Beach stated that the City of Beavercreek has been approached about the possibility of utilizing probationers to perform Community Service. Typically, a crew of four (4) to six (6) probationers will be supervised by one (1) City employee for the purpose of performing various tasks, primarily trash pickup and other cleanup detail. This additional labor will allow the City to utilize more highly skilled permanent and seasonal workers to concentrate on more critical tasks and provide clean-up activities on a more regular basis than was previously possible.

Mr. Leonard stated this is an excellent idea and asked if this service had been utilized before. Mr. Beach stated that it had been used by Public Service 8 to 10 years ago and more recently by the Parks Department. He stated that some of the difficulty was getting enough people for a crew and having the correct type of work for them to do.

Mrs. Howard MOVED to approve Resolution 09-8 seconded by Vice Mayor Giambrone and approved by unanimous voice vote.

DISCUSSION

Letter to Greene County

Mayor Vann asked Council for any comments about the letter to Greene County. Mr. Petrak and Mr. Hadley said that their concerns had been addressed. Mr. Petrak explained that it was an offer to Greene County to use our broadcasting and other types of resources to put information out to the citizens of Beavercreek relative to County activities.

Vice Mayor Giambrone stated that there were already items on Channel 5 about County activities so this is not any different that what we have already done. Mrs. Howard stated that there was also an opportunity to televise their meetings at a cost. Vice Mayor Giambrone wondered if there was a set of guidelines for using Channel 5. Mr. Frazier stated that there was a section on the website concerning Public Service Announcements. He stated that they are normally taped in house or received from other sources and screened for appropriateness for putting them on Channel 5.

Mr. Hadley MOVED to approve the letter to Greene County Commissioners as presented seconded by Mr. Leonard and approved by unanimous voice vote.

Memo of Understanding-Leadership Beavercreek

Mayor Vann stated that a group of citizens came forward and gave the City an opportunity to collaborate to allow them to produce Leadership Beavercreek curriculum. Mr. Cornell stated that at the retreat and a regular meeting they spoke about the concept of a leadership academy in the Beavercreek community and he asked Council what the City's involvement would be in the academy. He stated that the consensus at both meetings was to participate but not lead this effort throughout the Beavercreek community. Following the February 9th meeting they began internally drafting an agreement that met the overall intent of the Council in terms of the City's participation in the academy. Mr. Cornell stated that there had been a lot of discussion amongst stakeholders in the community on this initiative and that the shorter of the two drafts is what he and Mr. McHugh had worked on over the last few weeks related to the partnership with this group.

Mr. Petrak asked if they had discussions with the group while they were working on this agreement. Mr. Cornell stated that he had been in ongoing discussions with Mr. Russo and the group to be sure that what was in the draft would go along with the structure of their entity and that of the advisory board and thought that this agreement would work. Vice Mayor Giambrone stated that she would also like to add the discussion was that not only would we not lead but that we also would not commit financial resources because of our budget challenges even though they think it is a very worthwhile endeavor for community growth.

Mayor Vann stated that the second document tries to quantify and put out issues for discussion to have a clear understanding of who will do what. The consultants will work with the Advisory Board and Beavercreek Forward to raise scholarships and seed money to make this happen so that it will not take any City money. Mayor Vann stated that section IV limits the involvement of staff to six items and she would like to confirm or amend these items this evening.

Mrs. Howard stated that this version is too in depth and addresses internal things that should be discussed with the board and finalized. The shorter version written by Mr. Cornell and Mr. McHugh is to the point and addresses the priorities that were discussed, it is very simple and hands off and gives Mr. Cornell an advisory role which is what Council had agreed on.

Mr. Petrak stated that there are two versions of the same agreement and instead of fixing both versions they should pick which one they want and fix that version. Vice Mayor Giambrone stated that this shorter agreement was drafted by Mr. McHugh and that is what he is paid for and if it meets Council intent it will work. She stated that they are not sure what this group may decide to do and she is not willing to commit to printing, mailing and marketing assistance because they agreed to make no financial commitments. Mrs. Howard was also concerned about those costs and the advisory time of Mr. Cornell and she wanted that to be removed from the shorter agreement to prevent an obligation on the City's part.

Mr. Cornell stated that our involvement at the advisory level is appropriate. This is an organization that will have an impact, with success throughout the community and as such the City needs to be a participant.

After discussion Council agreed to remove printing and mailing from the second whereas and under number 2.

Mrs. Howard MOVED for the abbreviated Memo of Understanding as amended by Mr. McHugh, seconded by Mr. Petrak it was approved by unanimous voice vote.

Procedure for Introduction and Review of Council Requests

Mr. Hadley wanted to remove on number two “but in no case less than two weeks”,

Mr. Cornell stated that in some cases two weeks may not be enough time, even though that is what he had recommended, but he would let Council know what kind of time frame is needed or if more is needed.

Mayor Vann questioned Council, if an average citizen wants to discuss a storm water problem they are having, they can go directly to the City Manager and have their issue resolved, but she as a Council member would have to wait to bring an issue forward to discuss it at a formal Council meeting on the agenda and have four members vote for it to get it done. She was concerned if there was an urgent issue such as the airport JEDD that came up that it could not be addressed in a timely manner. Mr. Leonard liked the comparison but took issue with the citizen’s problem stating that it was something that directly affected them and stated that they were speaking about actual legislative issues that would take staff time. He thought that these rules would force an issue on the manager, if four members agreed to move forward.

Vice Mayor Giambrone read from the introduction “Before any action is taken by legislation or a report or study is undertaken” and stated that it was her understanding that the need for this is that if one person has a request to study something at length or to draft a piece of legislation when there has not been discussion about it, that is concerning. She stated that her goal and the reason she got on City Council was to have good public discussion, be transparent and accountable to the voters. Vice Mayor Giambrone stated if that means the City is going to take legislative action or spend resources undertaking a study or huge initiative there needs to be some discussion and agreement that it is the will of the majority of Council. She stated that was her understanding of it and not that it would prohibit them during Council time to have discussions about storm water issues or concerns about trees that Mr. Hadley brought up.

Mr. Petrak stated that he thought this was also for discussion purposes to make sure that everyone knows all sides of the story. Mrs. Howard was concerned that staff was already over tasked with the priorities that they had agreed upon at the retreat with the reduction in staff and that it should be a majority for any new project to make sure that they are going in the right direction.

Mr. Cornell stated that this process was a clarification of the legislative priorities that come from Council vs. the daily priorities or operational priorities that take up 95% of staff’s time dealing with citizen issues and requests. It is to be sure that there is consensus about pursuing legislation because many issues are brought up during Council time and staff leaves not knowing if they are priorities and what if anything should be done next.

Vice Mayor Giambrone stated that if they found that this was inhibiting anyone’s ability for discussion that this is not legislation, just an agreement to follow a four step plan, an operating procedure, and they can then change it. Mr. Cornell agreed and stated that this procedure clearly establishes that they have reached consensus and that it is a priority for legislation.

Mr. Hadley moved to approve the Four Step Initiation and Implementation Process removing “but in no case less than two weeks” in number two, it was seconded by Mrs. Howard it was approved by unanimous voice vote.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Mr. Cornell stated that he had received an e-mail request from Trustee Bob Stone late last week to take part in the development of a Land Use Plan for Beaver Creek Township and would like Council to let him know if they would want the City to be involved.

Mr. Cornell stated that he had attended the annual Chamber Awards Banquet and commented about what a great event it is. He said that he always comments there that we have the best public servants in the region, and Joy Hill who is this year's City of Beaver Creek Employee of the Year is one of those. She is a Communications Officer with Police Dispatch and has been with the City since August 1982 and always gives 110%. Congratulations to Joy Hill who is a phenomenal employee.

Mr. Cornell stated that the Employee of the Month as chosen by fellow employees is Matt Funk who is the Code Enforcement Officer in the Planning Department. He has been with the City since August 2007 and is kept very busy especially with spring setting in.

Mr. Cornell stated that for the 17th consecutive year the City of Beaver Creek has received the Excellence in Accounting Award which is the highest award you can receive in governmental accounting and financial reporting. Thanks to Mr. Kucera and the staff in the Finance Department for their efforts. The Financial Report is on the website at www.ci.beavercreek.oh.us if you are interested in looking at it.

Mr. Cornell stated that there would be one more work session this month on Monday March 30th at 7:00 p.m. with the Beaver Creek Township Trustees at Fire Station #61 on Dayton-Xenia Road. This is the first City and Beaver Creek Township work session and he is looking forward to a very open and positive partnership that is being built for the future governmental entities.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Vann stated that the Girl Scouts were hosting an event at Angel's Pass Memorial in Beaver Creek Community Park on Factory Road Sunday March 29th at 2 o'clock and the public is invited.

COUNCIL TIME

Mr. Hadley stated that Angel's Pass recently received national recognition. He said he had attended the Chamber Awards banquet and Susan Phillips received the Outstanding Community Service Award and the E. G. Shaw Award which is the highest award given by the Chamber was given to Bob and Marcie Mills

Mr. Hadley sent out his condolences to the Mills family at the passing of Marcie Mills on Sunday.

Mr. Leonard asked if he could get Council support to make the City of Beaver Creek take on a greener appearance through an environmental approach of recycling. He would like to see the City take the lead by recycling paper, cardboard and bottles and cans at all of their facilities.

Mr. Kucera stated that there was a six yard container at the City for recycling and he spoke with Waste Management and they are sending over ten 18 gallon containers for recycling for City Hall and the Police Department. The Public Service Department has a recycling program with the County and he will check into the Senior Center and Golf facilities.

Mr. Leonard stated that this did entirely address his request but at some time in the future would like to see a report to remind the citizens of what we are doing and have the containers in the building so that staff is also aware. Mr. Kucera stated that once they received the containers he would create a policy addressing the recycling and pickups. He wanted to find out from Waste Management if they could weigh the recycled contents so that we know how much we are recycling annually and will also find out the costs involved.

Mrs. Howard stated that Mr. Minear from Waste Management had called her after the discussion at the Council meeting about the recycling and explained about what it costs to pick up the trash and process the trash and recyclables. He said that we pay a nominal fee to sort the trash to keep it from going to the landfill. Mr. Minear stated that when the price for commodities goes up they do pass the additional income back to us. Everyone pays to recycle to keep the landfill from becoming full and from the possibility of a land fill going in our backyard. Mrs. Howard encouraged everyone to continue to recycle.

Vice Mayor Giambrone stated that she still had not gotten her answer why they have not removed the fuel surcharge since gasoline prices have dropped.

Vice Mayor Giambrone stated that she had presented the E.G. Shaw award to Bob and Marcie Mills for establishing a Child Advocacy Center in Greene County. The facility helps address the cases of child abuse to be sure that the offender pays and it is the best facility in the country. She stated that it is a tribute to Bob and Marcie Mills and the Mercurios and she wanted to thank them and extend condolences to the Mills family.

Vice Mayor Giambrone congratulated Janaki Venkayya, President and CEO of Globe Tech Exchange who is a Beavercreek resident. She was named by the YMCA of the Miami Valley as one of the "Women of Influence" and gave a very powerful speech about community and giving back and spoke about Beavercreek and about what it means to be part of a community. Vice Mayor Giambrone knows Mrs. Venkayya and said she started The Day of Caring

Vice Mayor Giambrone spoke about Clothes that Work which is an organization that serves Greene County residents. They provide professional clothing and assistance to job seekers who need that support; they are located at GreeneWorks on Ledbetter Road. Vice Mayor Giambrone and Eileen Austria co-sponsored an event to collect clothing and said that if you have gently used professional clothing it can be dropped off at GreeneWorks to help provide job seekers an interview outfit and once they get a job they will outfit them for at least one week for work. She stated that it was a tremendous program and helps all our neighbors in need.

Mr. Petrak reminded everyone about the Charter Review meeting on Monday March 26th. Mr. Petrak stated that when they spoke about Leadership Beavercreek he did not want Mr. Russo and the group to think that Council did not look at their proposal. He stated that Council thought the shorter version fit their needs and what they wrote was a very good concise agreement but did not fit as well.

Mr. Petrak stated that two or three weeks ago there was an article in the Dayton Daily News paper on a presentation by Rich Schultz of Green Cats to the County Commissioners. In that presentation he stated that some of his priorities for this year were to have regular scheduled trips to downtown Dayton and also to Beavercreek. Mr. Petrak stated he thought that was very presumptuous and he checked with Greene County and they said that is clearly his intention and is letting people believe that Beavercreek Council is in agreement with that. Mr.

Petrak did not think that is what Council had discussed and agreed upon so he asked the Clerk to look up information on the subject and she found a Resolution that Council had discussed at length in 1995 and passed which addressed public transportation in Beavercreek. Mr. Petrak stated that he thought that the resolution and a cover letter needed to be sent to Greene County Commissioners and other appropriate people to make sure they understand Council's position on fixed routes and time schedules within the City of Beavercreek because there is some confusion.

Mayor Vann asked for a copy of the resolution and wanted to know if they were going to discuss this at the next meeting. Mr. Hadley agreed and stated he was on Council when that happened and remembered the discussion. Mrs. Howard asked if there was a meeting coming up of the Greene County Commission that they would need to vote tonight. Mr. Petrak stated that there was no meeting but thought it urgent that they get the proper impression out there because Councils' position on this has been distorted. Mr. Leonard wanted a chance to look at the resolution and have Council all agree on their position. Vice Mayor Giambrone asked counsel if this resolution which was already on the books was binding, he stated it was the position of the City at this point. Vice Mayor Giambrone stated then that it should be ok to inform them then of our current legislative rules.

Mr. Petrak made a Motion to have Mr. Cornell send the resolution and a letter stating Council's position to the Greene County Commission and other appropriate people, seconded by Mr. Hadley it was approved by unanimous voice vote.

Mr. Jarvis stated that he was very impressed with the three young men that presented their DARE reports, Jacob, Mitchell and Andrew and the two scouts that helped to lead the pledge; he stated that the Cub Scout was his nephew Collin Maxwell and he was very proud of him.

Mr. Hadley MOVED to adjourn the meeting at 8:14 p.m. it was seconded by Mrs. Howard. The motion PASSED by unanimous voice vote.
